Advocacy

Engaging in advocacy is a way of acting for justice and participating in the transformation of the world, to bring about peace and justice for the entire planet.

Jesus referred to this as bringing about the 'reign of God'. This year we highlight campaigns that will help the children of Ghana avoid slave-like conditions in the production of chocolate; and update you on our ongoing campaigns in other areas, including the detention of children globally and the impact of mining in the Philippines.

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child recognises that every child has the inherent right to life.

It also recognises other rights, such as that of every child, including those with a mental or physical disability, to enjoy a full and decent life in conditions which ensure dignity, promote self-reliance and facilitate the child's active participation in the community. Every child's right to education is enshrined in the Convention, as is protection from economic exploitation or performing any work that is likely to be hazardous or to interfere with their education or be harmful to their health or their physical, mental, spiritual, moral or social development.

This year, students across Australia are encouraged to not only learn about Ghana and the work of the

Church there, but to do something extraordinary for mission through their fundraising, advocacy and prayers.

In Ghana there are many children who go to school, hang out with friends and family, and do fun things like sport. Distressingly, some children, especially those with a disability, struggle to have their basic needs met, such as food, clean water, healthcare and education.

Thankfully, the Nazareth Home for God's Children in the Diocese of Yendi in Ghana is a haven where children of all ages are loved and cared for unconditionally. Sister Stan Therese Mumuni, the Home's founder and director, has dedicated the last ten years to running the home, which currently cares for 78 boys and girls, providing them with safety, nutritious meals, healthcare and education.

Sister Stan ensures the children receive quality education so that they may one day gain employment and provide for themselves. Her dream is that they will return to their home community and show how the love and support of the Church has empowered them to develop and reach their goals.





The Nazareth Home for God's Children is one of the many critical initiatives established by the Catholic Church in Ghana to develop and nourish the country's most vulnerable young people. Without the tireless efforts of Sister Stan and other religious and lay missionaries around the country, many children will lose out on all that life has to offer.

The survival of these programs and the quality of life these children and young people experience rely so much on the support your school community can provide today.

Fundraising ideas include:

- Host a 'Rock your socks off' dance party, either during a lunch break, or maybe an after-school disco fundraiser with a gold coin contribution.
- Hold a 'Walk in someone else's shoes' day and bring in clothes to donate to a charity, share the clothes with classmates and wear something that is not your own for the day.
- Hold a 'Tech-free' day and research education around the world using books and storytelling (ask parents, grandparents, teachers, aunts etc.). Make a children's book and sell these.
- Hold a Movie day, with a movie that focuses on issues such as supporting vulnerable children, and ask for donations.
- Hold a Trivia event, find out as much as you can about Ghana and make up questions for children to answer. You can sell tickets to raise money.
